Dual Language Learners: Young children birth to age five who are mastering their home language while learning English simultaneously.

Benefits of Dual Language Learning


- Maintain close relationships with family
- Develop cognitive flexibility, logic and thinking skills
- Focus attention better
- More easily understand math concepts
- Develop executive function skills

Cultural Humility

- Self-Reflection and Self-Critique
- Confront Imbalances
- Develop Partnerships

Home Visitor Role:

- Help parents understand how their child develops language
- Bring and encourage activities that promote language development
- Model language, reading, singing and creating stories
- Screen the child for language and other delays
- Make a referral for Early Intervention, if you suspect delays
- Provide an interpreter when needed
- Offer resources and written materials in the family's home language, whenever possible
- Provide referrals for early education and adult English classes
- Support families as children transition to early childhood and school-based programs
